


April Showers

The rain umbrella appeared in the 17th century and was made out of silk which offered limited protection from the rain. The design we are familiar with was fashioned by Jonas Hanaway in 1750 in London. Although ridiculed, Jonas carried the umbrella everywhere, and by the late 1700's it was a common accessory for both men and women. In fact the umbrella was referred to as a Hanaway for years. Modern materials and styles made the umbrella a necessity for active outdoor people of the Model A era.

Jim's technical tip

"The Right Tool for the Job" - Part 1

I've been working with a new Model A mechanic lately, which reminded me of some basics on choosing the right tool for the job. Today we talk about choosing wrenches and sockets for use on nuts and bolts. The thing that determines your choice is how well you need to grip the hex, to allow you to apply the torque (twist) you need... and your access to the nut or bolt head.


Best Grip





Tiny Tips

Unless you really like to run the risk of shorting out the pigtail under the upper distributor plate everytime you change points (because you have to take off the distributor cam to get to the bottom side of the upper plate to loosen the pivot post nut for the moveable point), here is a small modification which allows the timing cam and upper distributor plate to stay in place while you change points. Remove the pivot post from an old set of points and grind the head into an oval shape just small enough to slip through the wrap-around spring. The remaining head should be adequate to keep the spring in place. Install this post (permanently) in the upper plate of the distributor. When installing a new set of points, remove the (new) pivot post from the moveable spring arm and just slide the spring down over the (permanent) post. It is essential that the correct gap be set at 0.022" for new points.


Ed Giovannella, Minuteman Chapter, Medway, MA

I thought you would find this “**Tiny Tip**” that our own member Ed Giovannella submitted to *The Restorer* magazine a number of years ago. Ed showed me how he modified the point post to allow the Model A points to be easily removed without the disassembly of the upper distributor plate or disturbing the timing of the engine. I have performed this modification on all my original distributors and spare points in my parts box. It takes only a few minutes to modify the points and I can attest that it sure makes changing the points an easy job.


