


Restoration Tip – Plastic Razor Blade

There are many instances during a restoration process where it is necessary to scrape material from a surface while preserving the integrity of the base material. Whether it be metal, glass, plastic or other base material, preventing scratches or gouging can save you hours of unnecessary restoration or simply preserve the original condition of an item. I have discovered manufacturers producing very good plastic razor blades that are very effective in accomplishing this task.

These plastic razor blades are also designed to fit with any of the standard blade holders on the market today as shown in the attached photo.







The replacement for the ubiquitous Model T was a brand new vehicle that brought new levels of design, safety and comfort to the mass market. Designed under the eye of Edsel Ford, the Model A featured aesthetically-pleasing lines, so much so that it was nicknamed the "Baby Lincoln." It offered 40 horsepower, twice that of the Model T, and offered advanced features like shock absorbers, four wheel brakes and a safety glass windshield. A variety of models were offered, ranging from the \$385 Roadster to the \$1200 Town Car. The much-anticipated introduction drew an estimated 10 million people to dealerships in the first 36 hours—50,000 in New York alone.


