


Minuteman Outing




Accommodations Update as of 2 November 2014

Tech Talk

A Cool & Quiet Model A

Installation of Sound Deadening and Thermal Insulation in a Model A Body

Anyone who rides in a Model A Ford for any length of time quickly comes to realize that these fantastic little cars are prone to noise and heat in the passenger compartment. There are squeaks, rattles, and vibrations in doors, quarter panels, steering parts, and in most of the body panels. On top of all that, heat seeps up through the floorboards, sometimes giving your passengers the hotfoot because of the proximity of the muffler under the floorboards. The engine also contributes to building heat through the sheet metal firewall.

Heat and noise are just issues we have to come to expect if you drive a Model A. Henry recognized the noise factor during Model A production by use of the "dum-dum" material that was slathered into the interior panels of doors and other interior body panels as the bodies traveled down the assembly line. It appears to have been only a token effort to reduce the "tinny" sound of the doors and panels. This sound deadening material was liberally applied, although to only small areas. It was a very durable concoction, as you will learn should you ever try to remove any of it.

With modern space age products available to the restorer today, both heat and noise concerns can be addressed quite successfully, and improvements can be accomplished with absolutely no change in the outward appearance of the car. There are several products available, most of them using some variation of a sound deadening pad with an adhesive backing. With interior upholstery panels and seats removed, it is a relatively simple matter to fit the sound deadening sheets to sections of interior body panels and doors. After you cut the sheet to fit, simply peel the backing, place the sheet in predetermined position, and pres The end result you will achieve is a much more solid feel to the body of your Model A. Tapping a knuckle on a sounddeadened panel is a rewarding experience, compared to the ringing, tinny sound you have with an untreated panel.

Turning to the issue of heat, there are a few things easily done to reduce the heat level in your car to make it much more pleasant for you and your passenger(s). Heat blocking foam pads can be used throughout the interior to accomplish this desired goal. These foam pads also have an adhesive backing easily fitted to the interior of the firewall to block excess engine heat. The same pads can be used under the carpet to block heat buildup from the muffler. I even used a thinner version of this pad while installing a new top in my steelback Victoria. The thin cotton batting normally used during top installation was substituted with a custom fit 1/8" waterproof foam pad with heat-blocking qualities. The product I chose for my sound-deadening project was called "Dyna-Mat", widely used in TV shows such as OverHaulin'. The companion product for heat blocking on the firewall, floorboards, and top was a very dense, waterproof foam pad called "Dyna-Liner". The Dyna-Mat products are a little on the pricey side, but there are similar products manufactured by other restoration companies that accomplish the same purpose.

At this point you may be asking yourself if you really want to go to this level of investment in cost of materials and your labor to do this, but I guarantee you would be most happy with the result. Down here in Texas, heat is something we are forced to deal with through long, hot summers. Reduction and/or elimination of as much heat and noise as possible will make for a much more enjoyable Model A experience for you and your passengers, and no one will ever know unless you tell them!

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
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
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
