HENRY FORD FACT

Ford was gifted a pocket watch by his father during his early teens. During that time, he dismantled and reassembled the watch, as well as the watches of several of his friends and relatives. Through these efforts, he gained quite a reputation as a watch re-pairman.

After the sad loss of his mother in 1876, his father wanted Henry to take responsibility and work on the farm. However, Henry disapproved of this and said that he was not interested in farm work. In his earlier years, he was willing to perform farm work due to the fact that his mother was present. However, he had no interest in the farm apart from his mother.

After being convinced he should seek a life in politics by his friend President Woodrow Wilson, Ford ran for a seat in the United States Senate in 1918. He only lost by 4,500 votes, even though he didn't spend a dime on his campaign.

Henry Ford was America's second billionaire, after oil magnate John D Rockefeller.

When he was only 20 years old, Ford was promoted to Chief Engineer of the Thomas Edison Illumination Company's main electrical plant in Detroit, which provided electrical power for the city. He worked there for six years before Edison himself encouraged Ford to follow his dreams of creating an affordable, reliable, gasoline-powered automobile.

What is an 'L' head engine?



Those of you intimately familiar with engines probably need no further explanation. For first, though, recently entering our hobby, hearing strange terms tossed around can be confusing. We blithely discuss OHV (overhead valve) engines, or 'L' head or side-valve engines. May I take a moment and explain what these phrases mean, and how an engine came to be labeled an 'L' head or and 'I' head engine?

The letter designation of an engine, i.e. an 'L'head, 'T'head, 'I'head or 'F'head is essentially a picture of the piston/valve configuration as viewed from the front.

An 'L' head often referred to as side-valve engine, has both the intake

valve and the exhaust valve situated on one side of the combustion chamber. The valves are in line with each other and, when viewed from the front of the engine, seem to form an inverted letter 'L' (the valves making up the bottom of the



letter 'L' and the combustion chamber/piston making up the upright of the 'L').



A 'T' engine has an intake valve on one side of the combustion chamber and the exhaust valve on the opposite side. Again, viewed from the front, the two valves form the crossbar of the letter 'T', and With a valve on opposite sides of the piston, the lines appears as the letter 'T'.

the piston making up the upright of the 'T'.

The 'F' head engine is an over/under configuration. One valve is in the block, while the other is in the head. With the two valves making the arms of the 'F', the com-



bustion chamber and piston make up the upright of the letter.



Finally we have the 'I' head or OHV engine. In this case the cam is in the block and the valves are situated above the piston (operated through push rods and rocker arms). Looking at the valves/piston from the front they simulate the letter 'I'.

With the valves above the piston, it appears to be an 'I' layout.

The Great Bambino's 1928 Estate for Sale

SAINT PETERSBURG, FL — Here's a chance to own a bonafide piece of history — the one -time winter estate of the Great Bambino. This 7,381-square-foot replica of an Italian villa may be the most unique waterfront home in La Vista on Tampa Bay. It once served as a winter refuge for Babe Ruth. Built in 1928, this brick mansion underwent a \$2 million restoration in 2001-06 and again in 2012 that preserved the estate's Old World details while updating it for modern living. I guess even in 1928 Babe Ruth was pretty well off. Price: \$2,199,000







NEWS You Didn't Know - EAR-MUFFLERS!

A young man from Farmington, Maine, patented his simple invention: earmuffs. Chester Greenwood, who first had the idea for this "improvement in ear-mufflers," as the patent documents describe it, at the age of 15, turned chilly ears into a business.

Like most inventors, Greenwood was trying to solve a problem. He loved to skate outdoors on the frozen ponds of his town, but he couldn't stay on the ice for very long. He was allergic to the protective wool caps with ear covers that were, at the

time, typically used as ear protectors.

Motivated by his sore ears, Greenwood devised a solution. He asked his grandmother to sew either pads of beaver fur or flannel onto a wire headband with two hoops on the ends. Greenwood's idea was clearly one whose time had come. Although his friends initially mocked him, the earmuff caught on quickly. Its popularity led Greenwood to make further improvements, such as replacing the wire with a band and hinging the pads. The factory he built near his hometown employed numerous Farmington residents and eventually became the seat of his earmuff empire, says Matt Hongoltz-Hetling for CentralMaine.com.

It's a cute story, but, according to Hongoltz-Hetling, Greenwood didn't exactly invent earmuffs. "It wasn't the first earmuff. It was an improved earmuff," patent agent Dennis Haszko told him. Greenwood's true innovation, and the reason he got a patent, was a v-shaved swivel hinge that kept earmuffs tight to the ear. Still, his patent and factory put Farmington on the map and kept locals employed. In its best year, 1936, the earmuff factory produced over 400,000 pairs.

Buoyed by his early success, Greenwood kept inventing, eventually accruing over 100 patents. Farmington still celebrates its most inventive son each year in December on Chester Greenwood Day.

Jim's Tech Tip

Installing the Starter "Bendix Drive"



The small Bendix Drive gear that's bolted to the starter motor puts up with a lot of use (and abuse when you forget to retard the spark before starting). Eventually you will be working on yours and I have a tip for you about installing it back on the starter shaft.

The Bendix is bolted to the shaft with 2 special bolts and lock washers, as shown in the photo below. One bolt has a specially-shaped end that goes down into a hole in the starter shaft. This is critical, to lock the Bendix to the shaft; do not substitute a plain bolt for this.



The other bolt is "special" only because it is only 11/16" long. This allows the bolt to lock the spring in place, without having the bolt actually touch the starter shaft. Don't be tempted to use a 3/4" long bolt instead of the correct shorter one. See the comparison photo of a 3/4" bolt and the correct bolt.



When this longer bolt is used, it presses against the starter shaft when tight and it messes up the Bendix operation.

Don't forget to install the half-moon shaped Woodruff key in the shaft before slipping the drive on the shaft. You may also use 2 spring clips (optional). Be sure to lock the bolts down tight by bending the ear of the special lock washer up against the bolt head. If you don't, these bolts will work loose and fly out of the starter drive.

I carry a spare Bendix spring (they are known to break) and a set of these special bolts and lock washers with me in my parts kit on tours. If I don't need them, someone traveling with us might. This will help quickly get them back on the road to.
