M.A.A.C. Update: Inspection Sticker Change by William Ellis

On its surface the new RMV rule that went into effect on Tuesday November 1, 2022, for our

annual vehicle safety inspections was to close a much loved 13 month loophole. Motor vehicles passing required inspections will get a new sticker, valid for one year, with the month the last sticker expired seemed to be targeting a practice by some Bay State car owners that were trying to extend an additional free month or two beyond the normal 12-month vehicle safety inspection cycle.



Those owners will no longer get a sticker displaying the month the inspection occurred, but the month the last inspection occurred. So a May expired sticker car will get a May new sticker no matter when inspected past the original monthly deadline.

The problem for antique and collector car owners whose vehicles are undergoing extensive restoration or long-term repairs resulting in their vehicles not being ready for its regularly scheduled annual inspection is more troubling. Having inspection stickers that expired in a previous calendar year are facing a more perplexing

problem with this new rule. Previous year inspected vehicles will receive a January sticker of the current year the vehicle is being inspected, no matter the month the vehicle is inspected. You can imagine the consequences collector vehicle owners will be facing if they now have a January inspection sticker. This change does not impact the requirements for newly purchased vehicles which must be inspected within seven days of the vehicle registration date,

and they will receive a sticker of the month which it was inspected and is valid for one year. Of course, this could also mean you may want to avoid purchasing an antique or collector vehicle during the winter months.

M.A.A.C. is already hearing complaints as it could require owners to violate the law every year when they take then out of winter storage to get their car inspected in the spring.

When the new Ford was first available in 1928 there were only a few models available: a Phaeton, Roadster, Coupe, Tudor, Fordor and the Pick-up. The prices of the Model A reflected the times and up from the T era. In 1928 the economy growing, although there was very mild recession in 1927 caused by Henry Ford.

(The 1927 recession was also associated with Henry Ford's shut-down of all his factories for six months in order to changeover from the Model T to the new Model A automobile. Though the Model T's market share was declining after 1924, in 1926 Ford's Model T still made up nearly 40 percent of all the new cars produced and sold in the United States.)

But 1928 was booming and car prices were up. Unfortunately the financial stability of the country and stock market was on shaky ground and in 1929 it all came crumbling down. The impact negatively effected all business segments, including the automobiles industry. With sales dropping companies had to make adjustments. You can see from this chart that Ford lowered the price of some of it's models starting in 1930 and continued into 1931 with more price reductions. Fortunately their were still lots of buyers , if not there might not be the Model A hobby today.

Ladies Winter Coats


Cold weather is just around the corner and the time when we put on our warm coats. Back in 1929 the ladies had the same idea. The fall -winter catalog for the Charles William Stores of New York City has many pages of fashionable coats. The coats shown here are probably more dressy than everyday coats as they feature materials of Suede and Velour and were trimmed with Beaverette or French Coney Fur. But, as you can see the price for such luxury ranged from \$7.96 to \$15.95. Seems like some great bargains. I should point out there was also a listing for a full length Racoon coat for \$65, which equals to \$1,100 in today's money. At that price the ladies took special care of those coats which is why we still find them today. Stay warm!


