Adding a Passenger Side View Mirror

There are several passenger side mirror options out there for us to add to our car, to see a bit better what traffic is over there. You can get a mirror that attaches to your door hinge, to your wind wing, etc.







But after you install it, you will discover that you really can't see much in it. It is almost useless, especiallywhen trying to help you change lanes.

Here's my little Tech Tip: Add a small "bubble mirror" to the face of that flat mirror, using a couple of strips of two-sided tape. Hunt around for a bubble mirror that closely matches the diameter of your flat mirror. Look for them in auto parts stores, general merchandise stores, truck stops.

Now you will really be able to see what is on that side of the car or truck!

Secretary's Report

No June 1, 2021 Meeting Nothing to Report - Stay well

Five States In 1929 Abolished Speed Limits

Maximum speed limits were abolished in five states in 1929, while 12 stated raised the limit, with the objective of speeding up traffic, according to reports received by the California State Automobile Association. Kansas, Tennessee, Vermont and Wisconsin prescribe a speed that is "reasonable and proper". In effect, this means that speed is not to be considered prima facie evidence of reckless driving, and such cases will be considered on their merits.

With improved highways and added safety qualities in motor cars, the tendency throughout the country has been to speed up traffic, and each year finds the legislature of various states fostering proposals to abolish maximum speed laws.

SPEED LIMITS INCREASED

States which increased their speed limits by action of the legislature during 1929 are: California, from 25 miles per hour to 40; Delaware, from 30 to 35; Illinois, from 35 to 45; Minnesota, from 35 to 45; Nebraska, from 35 to 45; Nevada, from 45 to 50; New Mexico, from 35 to 45; Ohio, from 35 to 45; Pennsylvania, from 35 to 40; South Dakota, from 25 to 40; Texas, from 35 to 45, and Virginia, from 35 to 45.

A total of 11 states do not prescribe maximum speed laws. These are: Connecticut, Florida, Indiana, Kansas, Maine, Michigan, Montana, Tennessee, Vermont, Wisconsin and Wyoming.

The limits in other states range from 20 miles an hour in Massachusetts to 50 miles per hour in Nevada, with the majority of states placing the limit at between 35 and 45 miles an hour.

On the Road Repairs

Two of these repairs were on Model A's that will be driving back to CA. One of the CA cars was actually on it's way back and ran into problems while still in NH. (more later)

One Model A had a timing gear fail while going down MT Washington Rd. This resulted in some bearing damage as the oil pump was not working while the engine was still being used to slow the decent. Trailered home.

Back to the CA cars, in addition to the headgasket, another A had a slipping clutch. Fortunately the group made contact with a White Mountain club member who opened up his garage for the repairs to be made. They are back on the road.



A few of the productive manufacturers during 1928-1931 were: US Wallkill River Works, Walden New York The New York Knife Company, Colonial Providence RI, and Shapleigh Hardware Company/Diamond Edge Company, Boker Knife Company, Solingen Germany and the United States of America, Hammer Brand Knives, and the Camillus Knife Company.



referred to as the tang stamp. The knife could have any number of blades located at one hub, at opposite ends of the knife, or a combination.





The knives varied in length from two- and- one half inches up to seven- and- three fourth inches. Various materials were used for the handles; wood, ivory, polished steel, pearl, brass, celluloid, silver, bone known as stag handles.

Men and women in era could carry a pocket knife for various ensembles and occupations. A well-dressed man could wear a pocket knife in a vest pocket with a chain similar to a watch fob. A golfer might have used a pocket knife to clean the dirt from the cleats of his shoes. A woman could have a small



knife in her purse for personal protection or to make adjustments of the points on her Model A. Larger knives with a blunt blade would have been used as an utility knife.





Era pocket knives can add interesting information to the written description of your fashion ensembles, valuable points toward the final score, and a bit of spark to

the entrant's overall appearance.



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
