

I was around 21 when buying my first A. I think I paid \$ 150 or so for a Tudor sedan. It had a broken right engine mount. When you applied the brake, the whole tranny would lift up about an inch before the brakes would work. To get thru inspection in Washington DC back then, their system was to check that all the brakes were working and with near the same pressure. A nearby shop jacked the engine up and welded part of a shovel to "fix" the broken mount! It passed. So my tip is to keep a broken shovel under your seat. You just never know.

Back then, you could buy a rebuilt short block from Sears for (as I recall) under 100 bucks. The block would have been cleaned and re-Babbitted. As they tore the blocks down, all the salvageable pistons and valves would be in a pile. This was well before Magni-fluxing the block was around so just a visual check. After boring the cylinders & grinding valve seats, they would go to the pile of parts and select a set of valves and pistons of the right diameter. These used piston's skirts would then be internally expanded to the specs of the original piston. What brought this to mind was recently seeing two collapsed pistons in a truck, and memories of a trip long ago to Maine when a piston collapsed in my Tudor.

#### **Passing of Richmond "Rich" Bell**

Ed Note: Rich Bell was not a members of the Minuteman club but was well know by many of our members. If you have been in the Model A hobby for a long time you know him from flea markets and Model A meets. Rich had a Model A Parts business and many of us bought parts from him. He was also an avid number plate collector and had a museum quality collection of them. I always enjoyed listening to his stories of his early Model A days. He will be missed.

NORWICH, VT - Richmond Randolph Bell (95), beloved husband, father, grandfather and great-grandfather, died peacefully in his sleep at his second home in Norwich, Vermont on June 14, 2020 of a rare and aggressive form of lymphoma. Rich was born

on March 22, 1925 in the birthing room in his family home in Wellfleet, Massachusetts, delivered by his father Dr. Clarence John Bell, who was the town doctor. Like his father, Rich was thought of fondly as "the heart and soul of Wellfleet." His great character, calm demeanor, fairness to all and his service to his town and country were his hall-marks. He will be fondly remembered for his good-natured jokes, quick-witted puns and for regaling family and friends with vivid stories, often featuring youthful adventures and Wellfleet history. His love for and encyclopedic knowledge of antique Ford automobiles and license plates is as much a defining feature as his twinkling blue eyes. It was a treasured family tradition for Rich to drive his antique cars in Wellfleet Independence Day parades, loaded with his children, then later his grandchildren.

Rich's love of Model A's began at age 3, when his father took delivery of a new Model A Ford at 3 PM on September 7, 1928. Little Richmond would stand on the seat and hold on to the dashboard so he could look out the window while bouncing down the dirt roads. When he grew up he wanted one too, but his father made him wait until he was 12. Then, with \$10.00 (yes, ten) saved from delivering newspapers, he bought his first Model A in Chatham and paid .50 for delivery. For his 16th birthday, his father gave him a 1930 coupe with a rumble seat which he owned up until a few days before his death (pictured above). Many cherished family memories were made with that coupe.

At age 19, not long after his father died, Rich was drafted as a Private into the U. S. Army during World War II. He served in the 29th infantry Division that landed on Omaha Beach, Normandy in Operation Overlord. After 19 months he was discharged as a Corporal. He was awarded the Bronze Star Medal for meritorious achievement in ground operations in the Normandy campaign and 3 Purple Hearts for wounds received in combat in St. Lo and the Vire area, both in France, and Baesweiler, Germany. Last summer the Consulate General of France, in Boston, presented Rich with the prestigious French Legion of Honor, the highest French decoration awarded for service to France.

After years as an insurance investigator for Retail Credit Company, in the early 1970s Rich turned his antique car hobby into a mail order business called Vintage Ford Center, which he operated out of his father's old doctor's office on Main Street. He called himself a born merchant and playing "store" was a favorite childhood game. Customers would call and describe a funny sound their car was making, Rich would diagnose the ailment from the wheeze, clunk or hiss, and mail out the parts the same day. Customers often explained that they planned their summer vacations around a pilgrimage to Rich's car parts store, to feed their hobby and drink in the lore.

Rich was past commander of the American Legion Post in Wellfleet. Like his father, he was a member of the Cape Cod Five Cents Savings Bank Board of Trustees for 40 years, and a member of the Board of Corporators for 20 years, retiring in the past few weeks. He was a member of the Nauset school committee, served on the town finance committee, the Republican town committee, and was the town election warden for many years.

In addition, Rich was a member of the Wellfleet Historical Society and a founding member of the Cape Cod Antique Car Club, as well as a member of the South Shore Antique Car Club, two Model A Restorer's Clubs (in Norwich and Cape Cod) and the Automobile License Plate Collector's Association.




