
Flea Market Help

Secretary's Report

Minutes of the Minuteman Model A Ford Club June 4, 2025

President Harold Samuels opened the meeting at 7:30 with 30 people in attendance. He led us in the pledge of allegiance.

The Secretary's report and Treasurer's reports were accepted as printed in the Oil Leak.

Vice president, Peter McLaughlin reported on correspondence. He reported a \$125 donation from Sorrento's for an ad in the N.E. Meet program. We also got an acknowledgement for a donation from us to MAFFI for a brick in memory of recently passed member Clyde Kelton. The brick will be installed before Model A Day at the Gilmore Museum on the third weekend of September. MAFFI also sent acknowledgement to Clyde's daughter. Donations from our club were acknowledged for donations sent in memory of Bob Griffin's daughter and Rick Gadbois's mother. He also announced the meet in Waterbury, VT August 8,9 and 10.

Membership, Nan Linden reported that there were no new members this month.

It was reminded that there were still license plate toppers for sale at the head table.

Tour Chair, Don Ross, reported on recent tours, thanked those who attended the two parades in Wellesley. Our attendance in the parades brought in \$800 to the club.

Future tours were then highlighted: June 8 Bay State Motor Festival in Cushing Park. June 14 Flag Day Parade, On June 15 New Horizons wants cars to come as we have done in the past, June 21 we are planning to go to Benchmark in Woburn, the National Meet will be in Gettysburg June 15 – 22, June 19 a tour to Pizzi Farm in Waltham, June 26 Wayland Community concert in Wayland Center, July 2 is our next meeting and July 4 is the Sudbury Parade.

National News Doug Linden reported on the MARC Convention in Gettysburg and the MAFCA Tour will go through VA, MD, and PA. He mentioned that in addition to the brick in honor of Clyde at the MAFFI museum, we donated enough money to purchase a "MY A" plaque for Clyde. We are just trying to locate a picture for the plaque.

The New England Meet we are hosting in September was addressed by chair Tom Zappala. We have 80 registrants and hope to double that by meet time, The host hotel rooms are sold out but we have the Westford Regency and Littleton Marriott for extra rooms. We're selling ads, collecting raffle items and planning tour routes. We have a Beatles tribute band on Saturday night and a DJ on Friday night. Volunteers will be needed for parking, registration, raffle room volunteers and people will be needed for the repair tent. Also added to the event will be the Hubley Derby and word is being spread to other Model A clubs. Food donations will be needed for the hospitality room and raffle tickets are needed for the raffle.

President Harold called for old business, and it was reassured that the money for the Wellesley parades will be forthcoming.

New Business, Doug Linden reported on bills in the legislature from the Mass. Assoc. of Car Clubs. There is a bill to eliminate duplicate plate

numbers which would negatively impact the Year Of Manufacture (YOM) plates. There's a bill to allow restoration of YOM plates, and one to eliminate inspection for cars belonging to a recognized car club and are 45 years or older.

Coffee Pot Needs Nan Linden requested someone to make coffee for

future meetings. Barbara McElhiney volunteered for the next meeting.

Refreshments this month were brought by Tom, Ben and Barbara and next month with be Doug Farrel, Don Ross and Craig Martin.

Before we adjourned for the 50/50 raffle, Doug Linden showed the ticket selling device built by member John Pierce and it was announced that Tour list copies and Oil Leak copies were available at the head table.

Riviera Blue, Washington Blue, and Tacoma Cream, dual side-mount spares, Goodyear diamond tread white-wall tires and metal stems. With Summer Grilling season coming up, do you know the history of Kingsford charcoal?



Edward Kingsford & Henry Ford

Ford Motor Company sold more than one million Ford Model Ts in 1919. Each one used 100 board feet of wood for parts such as the frame, dashboard, steering wheel, and wheels. Because of the amount of wood needed, Henry Ford decided to produce his own supply. He enlisted the help of Edward G. Kingsford, a real es-

tate agent and timber cruiser from Michigan, to locate a supply of wood. Kingsford's wife was a cousin of Ford. [2] In the early 1920s, Ford acquired large timberland in Iron Mountain, Michigan, and built a sawmill and parts plant in a neighboring area which subsequently became Kingsford, Michigan. The mill and plants produced sufficient parts for the cars, but generated waste such as stumps, branches and

sawdust. Ford suggested that all wood scraps be processed into charcoal.^[3] A University of Oregon chemist, Orin Stafford, invented a method for making pillow-shaped lumps of fuel from sawdust and mill waste combined with tar and bound together with cornstarch. He called the lumps "charcoal briquettes."^[4] Thomas Edison designed the briquette factory adjacent to the sawmill and Kingsford ran it. Ford named the new business Ford Charcoal. It was a model of efficiency, producing 610 lb (280 kg) of briquettes for every ton of scrap wood. In the beginning, Ford's "briquettes" were sold only through Ford dealerships. The charcoal was marketed to meat and fish smokehouses, but demand soon exceeded supply.^[5]

By the mid-1930s, Ford was marketing "Picnic Kits" containing charcoal and portable grills, capitalizing on the link between motoring and outdoor adventure that his vaga-

bond travels popularized. "Enjoy a modern picnic," the packages read, "Sizzling broiled meats, steaming coffee, toasted sandwiches." But it wasn't until after World War II that backyard barbecuing took off, thanks to suburban migration and increased marketing efforts. In 1951 an investment group bought Ford Charcoal and took over operations, renaming it Kingsford Charcoal in honor of Edward G. Kingsford and Kingsford, Michigan.

TIPS FOR YOUR COOLING SYSTEM

From Doug and Herb's Tech seminar on Mar. 29, 2025 (Diablo A's)

- -The fins on your radiator must be in good condition for maximum heat transfer.
- -Most cooling system problems can be traced to a malfunctioning radiator.
- -A good radiator shop can tell you if your radiator is worth rebuilding.
- -Consider a 10 fin per inch replacement if you are re-coring or buying a new radiator.
- -A lot of overflow tubes (remove the radiator cap and you will see it) are too short. It can be extended with a short piece of plastic tubing run almost to the top of the cap.
- -Only add water or coolant when the engine is warm (water expands when it gets hot).
- -If you have an original steel two-bladed or steel 4-bladed fan you should change it to an aluminum two-bladed fan or a plastic 6-bladed fan. The old ones have been known to fly apart and end up in your radiator or through your hood (this is not good!).
- -Water pumps are easily rebuilt from kits from the major Model A parts suppliers.
- -Some folks are going to "leak-less" water pumps which you can buy ready to go or you can rebuild yours that way.
- -If you have a traditional water pump, be sure to use only "water pump" grease on the front bearing otherwise you will get chassis grease in your radiator which is no good.
- -Cooling system additives are highly recommended. There are many choices, talk to your friends who are experienced.




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


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
