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

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Installing New Radiator Hoses


Heat takes a toll on the radiator hoses, especially the upper hose. The radiator hoses on a Model A can be a pain to install, particularly the lower ones with the pipe. Here are a few tips I have picked up to make the job easier.

Use a lubricating non-hardening sealant inside the hose ends to make it easier to slide them on to the engine and radiator necks, and easier to move them around when you need to. The best one that I have found is called Hylomar AF (I get it from W.W. Grainger). A thin coating inside the hose helps it slide around when installing, and will also make it easier to remove in the future.

On the lower pipe, install one short hose on each end of the pipe and secure each with a clamp. Estimate where you want the hoses to be, but be prepared to move them later after a trial fitting. Slide the hose end first on to the radiator outlet at the bottom and slide it far forward. Then work the other end's hose over the cast iron water inlet and slide up. Feel through the hose to find the bead on the inlet and clamp on the engine side of the bead. Then tighten the clamp at the radiator.

The upper hose uses a similar technique. Slide the hose first down on the cast iron engine gooseneck. Carefully work the other end over the radiator inlet and slide it up. Then position the hose clamps near the end of the hose and tighten them.

Do not over tighten the hose clamps, especially the ones on the radiator. If you do, you can buckle and crush the thin brass, and you will cut into the hoses. You should not have to make the clamps too tight if you use some sealant. Start out with them just snug and then only tighten more if coolant drips from the hose when the system is full. After driving a few times, go back and check the clamps, snug them up a bit if needed.

Sad news to report, long time member Jim True has passed away due to complications from COVID-19. Jim was active in the club for many years and served as club President and as Treasure for both the 1988 National Convention in Sturbridge and the 2001 New England Meet. It was through Jim's guidance overseeing the national convention that we were able to establish our endowment fund which is still providing benefit to the club today.

Jim was a regular member of the Winter Blah's flea market team and always the last one to leave as he headed up the cleanup committee. Jim was pretty noticeable driving his AA truck, it was big and VERY red. He took great pride in his personal restoration projects, from start to finish. His 1931 Model

AA truck was literally restored to original specifications including the lumber from Georgia (Georgia Pine) for the bed.

One of Jim's passions was for boating and being on the water. His boat "projects" included a 1967 23-foot Owens cabin cruiser and 1975 Chris-Craft 25-foot express cruiser – named respectively, "Its True" and "Its True Too." While restoring his boats was an important task, what he truly loved was being on the water in them. He explored the entire eastern seaboard from Penobscot Maine through Boston Harbor down to the Chesapeake Bay and up and down the Rappahannock River and beyond.

Cleaning the Glass Sediment Bowl

Recently I was out driving my Coupe running errands. I pulled out of a parking lot when the car started to surge and jerk which ended with a big backfire. That seemed to clear the

problem and I drove on my merry way without further incident. I wondered as I drove home why that happened. The one thing that came to mind is that my carburetor jets had been clogged with debris which was then blown clear by the backfire. So I checked the sediment bowl when I returned home. Sure enough, upon inspection, there were some suspect particles in the sediment bowl. Below I have included some information from Jul/Aug 1998 Restorer on cleaning the glass sediment bowl.

The glass type sediment bowl can be cleaned by removing the glass bowl.

- 1) Turn OFF gas shut off valve.
- 2) Turn the wheel under the glass bowl counter-clockwise 3 or 4 turns and release the bail wire.
- 3) The bowl can then be removed for cleaning.
- 4) Clean or replace the filer screen. The screen must sit fully into the recess in the top of the bowl. A new screen may have to be trimmed to fit below the top edge of the bowl.
- 5) Install a new cork gasket on the top edge of the bowl. (over the brass screen)
- 6) Place the bowl in the casting and slip the wire bail under the bowl and tighten the wheel. (just enough to keep fuel from leaking)
- 7) Turn ON the gas shut off valve before driving.

I like to put an old paint mixing container under the sediment bowl to catch any fuel that might spill out. I prefer using the cork gaskets to the neoprene gaskets that are also available. The ethanol fuel tends to make them deteriorate quickly. It's a good idea to check the glass sediment bowl every couple of months and keep the debris from clogging your carburetor.




Southborough Memorial Day Parade

Did You Know

Ford Flathead V-8s Lived On To 1967 By: David Ziegler

The Ford Motor Company had branches in many countries with distinct lines and Models of cars. In the past that also included France. There Ford merged with the French company Mathis (1934) under the new name "Matford" and one of their later models became the "Matford Vedette" (1950) with the Ford Flathead V-8 installed. In November of 1954, Simca bought it all, so an almost identical "Simca Vedette" came the following year (1955).

Simca made the Vedette for several years, and the very last of them were made in Brazil in the early 1970's. Chrysler took over Simca in 1958. So the last of these legendary Ford flathead V-8 engines for, civilian use, were made from 1959 to 1967 by Ford's rival, Chrysler, in Brazil.

The French engines came in several different setups but the block in all of them were almost identical to the late Ford 8BA made from 1949 to 1953 except for the bell housing that were identical to the early 1932 to 1948 engines. It is said the French engines were of better quality, but generally speaking they are compatible with Ford parts. DZ

IMPORTANT RMV Update

The annual motor vehicle safety and emissions inspection expiration dates are being extended as follows:

- All commercial and non-commercial vehicle inspection stickers that expire on March 31, April 30, and May 31 have been extended for 60 days.
- Inspection stickers that expire in March 2020, were originally extended until May of 2020 have another 60 day extension applied and will now expire in July 2020.
- Inspection stickers that expire in April 2020, will now expire in July 2020.
- Inspection stickers that expire in May 2020, will now expire in July 2020.
- Commercial and non-commercial vehicles that are issued a failed inspection sticker (indicated by a sticker with a red or black letter 'R') that is due to expire in the month of March, 2020, must be reinspected by May 31, and all vehicles issued a failed inspection sticker due to expire in the month of April, 2020, must be re-inspected by June 30. Additionally, the one free re-test for these vehicles is also extended to May 31 or June 30 provided the re-test is performed at the same inspection station that performed the initial inspection.
- Regardless of the date of inspection, vehicles issued a failed inspection sticker due to a safety defect (indicated by a sticker with a red letter 'R') shall **not** be operated until appropriate repairs have been completed.
