

Egyptian Fashion Influence



ever During the Model A era, travel to Egypt was promoted. Ever since King Tutt's tomb was discovered the romance and mystery of the land of the pyramids and Nile River captivated people everywhere.

In the fashion world colors were influenced by the Egyptian theme – such as Nile green, which was commonly seen in dresses, undergarments and sleep wear. These images shown are from Model A era catalogs.

The shades of green were all described as Nile green, but there was always a little variation between manufacturers, kind of the same problem we now have matching Model A paint colors.



BOB WRIGHT AGE 82

INVENTIONS DURING THE MODEL A ERA ***1928***



BUBBLE GUM: Walter E. Diemer (January 8, 1904 – January 8, 1998) was an American accountant, for Fleer who, in 1928, invented bubble gum. Although an accountant by trade, Diemer liked to experiment with gum recipes in his spare time. In doing so, he accidentally stumbled upon a unique recipe. The gum was pink because it was the only food coloring in the factory, which is the reason most bubble gum today is pink. Fleer began marketing the new gum as "Dubble Bubble." Diemer taught himself how to blow bubbles as a selling point for the gum, helping

to demonstrate how Dubble Bubble differed from all other chewing gums. Sold at the price of one cent a piece, sales of Dubble Bubble surpassed \$1.5 million in the first year. The original package also included a color comic strip. The business was sold in 2003 to Tootsie Roll Industries.



REESE'S PEANUT BUTTER CUPS: In the early 1920s, H.B. Reese, an employee of The Hershey Company, started making candy in the basement of his Hershey home. When Reese created Peanut Butter Cups as part of an assortment of candies in 1928, the first generation of chocolate and peanut butter fans made the candy his bestselling item.

The Hershey Company supplied H.B. Reese with the chocolate coating for his candy and maintained a close relationship with him throughout his candy ventures. In 1956, his six sons took over the business and eventually sold it to The Hershey Company in 1963.



the meeting, I finally decided to get my vacuum wiper repaired. I sent it out and it works great. Hopefully I won't have to use it. **#** Dave Libbey removed the head of his Model A engine. It was stuck, but he eventually got it off buy removing almost all of the studs. He has it all back together



and running now. **#** Harold Legge is tracking down an annoying vibration in his coupe that seems to be engine rpm related. **#** Jack Stokinger recently replaced a broken front spring perch. This is definitely an unusual part to break on a Model A, but it did.

I'm sure others have projects underway as well and I hope you have success in getting the job done.

THE MODEL & VACUUM WINDSHIELD WIPER

The Model A vacuum windshield wiper replaced the electric wiper starting in late 1929. My vacuum wiper hasn't been working for sometime and at Hershey last year I talked to Rob Ficken of Ficken Wiper Service in NY. He indicated that the wipers were made by the Trico company and the service replacement wiper motors for the Model A could be rebuilt. I have been using Rain-X for years, and it works great, but I figured it was time to get a the wiper motor working again. I found information online on rebuilding the wiper, and I even had the wiper motor repair kit, but I elected to send it to Ficken to have it professionally rebuilt. I Mailed it to NY on a Wednesday and got the rebuilt wiper back the next Thursday. Very quick service and came back with a three year warranty.

I bench tested the wiper before putting it back on the Model A and it worked perfectly.

As I said, I decided to send the wiper out to be rebuilt.

I still hope it doesn't rain while on a tour, but at least I'll know the wiper is up to the task if it does.



Restoring the Vacuum Wiper


Wanting to restore my Trico vacuum wiper, I could not find any information anywhere. So, if you need to restore one, here is the information.

Buy a restoration kit. Then take the back off the motor. Take it apart and carefully lay out the parts in the order taken out. Take off top; if you have a special wrench available, it is easier. I used a small crescent wrench. Hone out inside where the paddle goes in. At each end of paddle, lubricate the ends with light oil. Insert paddle and work back and forth until it flows easily. Lay gaskets on, put top back on. On back put parts back in reverse order. Make sure air lines are good.



Not many people today will remember the old Burma-Shave roadside adverting signs, but they appeared alongside major U.S. highways for several decades from the 1920's into the 1960's. Burma-Shave was one of the first brushless shaving creams, introduced in 1925 by Allan Odell. Odell came up with the


idea of using a series of 5 or 6 short signs, each with a line or two of a clever rhyme or saying. Rather than quickly glancing at the signs as they would with most roadside billboards, motorists paid

close attention to each of the distinctive red and white Burma-Shave signs so that they wouldn't miss the punch line at the end. The advertising was a great success, and Burma-Shave signs appeared alongside highways all across America. Burma-Shave sales peaked in the late 1940's and held steady for several years before gradually declining. In 1963, Burma-Shave was sold to Gillette, and by 1966 most of the signs were gone. Some of them ended up in museums, including the Smithsonian.

Shaving Brushes You'll soon see 'em On the shelf In some museum Burma Shave (1930)


<u>March</u>
