Doug Linden will discuss Model A generators and alternators.



At the February meeting I gave a short presentation on the various options to charge the battery on a Model A. The Model A generator as supplied was a very crude unregulated device. As a result it can overcharge or undercharge the battery. Many of us have switched to alternators which are internally regulated to only charge the battery with as much current as required. With modern electronics, a standard Model A generator can be upgraded with a circuit board, that mounts on the inside back cover of the generator. The device replaces the generator's third brush and now can fully regulate the current flowing to the battery, the same as

and now can fully regulate the cur an alternator. The big advantage of this is you have the original looking generator with modern current regulation. Something to consider if you want to maintain an original looking engine compartment. *Doug Linden*

~ News From The Era ~ THE PINES WINTERFRONT

Back in the early days of automobiles, one of the problems with driving in cold weather was that the water in a car's radiator could freeze. This could cut off the circulation of cooling water, ironically causing the engine to overheat. The radiator sits right in the front of the car behind the grille, so to avoid freezing, folks would sometimes put a blanket over the grille or a piece of cardboard between the grille and the radiator to keep cold air out.

The Pines Winterfront Co. of Chicago manufactured thermostatically controlled radiator shutters. Invented by James Raleigh in the early 1920s, the Winterfront had a thermostat that pressed against the radiator core. Its shutters cut off airflow when cold, allowing the engine to warm up. When warmed up, the threshold was said to be 130 degrees F (appropriate in the days of alcohol-based antifreeze with a low boiling point), and the thermostat operated levers that opened the louvers.




This may be a Winterfront unit on a Model A

Winterfronts were sold at auto service stations and via the Sears and Roebuck catalog. Business was good enough that a larger factory was designed by the firm Mundie & Jensen and built in 1929. But the young company didn't last long in its new building.



Some of the nicer models of cars came with louvers in the front that could be opened and closed manually to control the flow of cold air over the radiator. Stutz, Duesenberg, and Marmon (and others?) all used Pines shutter assemblies on their factory radiators. Ford did not.



Sometime in the 1930s, manufacturers began to install thermostats inside their engines. Thereafter, the need for Winterfronts faded. Temperature-control technology in cars was making the Winterfront obsolete. The Pines Winterfront Co. dissolved in 1940 and the factory building was sold.

Jim's Tech Tips "Preventing Problems with the Starter Switch Rod"

The Starter Switch Rod passes through the firewall and screws into the Starter Switch. You step on the head of the rod to start the car.

You will find that today's reproduction rods screw quite easily into and out of the switch. This can be nice when you are assembling things.

But I have found on more than just a few cars the engine vibration can cause the rod to unscrew itself and back out of the switch. You hit a bump and the rod drops down and makes contact with the post on



the starter switch, where the battery cable connects. Yikes! That's a direct short to ground, with a LOT of amps behind it.

So you want to make the rod a bit harder to turn when installing it in the switch. Add a small drop of blue thread locker to the rod before you screw it in, or gently tap the threads a little with a hammer to deform them and make them harder to screw in and out.

Another simple solution, if you are not doing a car for Fine Point Judging (because it is not how the switch was originally done), is to add a 5/16" nut to the threaded end of the rod before screwing it into the switch. When you have the rod where you want it (desired button height inside the car, etc.) use that nut as a jam nut and lock the rod to the switch. It will not back out while driving, but you can easily undo it when you need to take it apart.

Whichever approach you choose, you will have have more trouble-free miles if you get ahead of this potential problem. Until next time...

Yes, the starter rod had disconnected from the switch and it was so close to the battery cable. Yikes this could have been disastrous. Fortunately I had a nut that we used to lock the rod in place and it's still there doing its job




Meeting Information
