


"Artie-Fact" THE "SPOKEN" WORD

Ever go to a car show and notice the weird colors on Model A wheels?

Here is the official "skinny" according to the MAFCA Paint & Finish Guide.

All Model A's came standard with black enamel wheels until June 1930. Five body styles were equipped with colored wheels as standard: the Deluxe Roadster, Deluxe Phaeton, Convertible Sedan, Deluxe Fordor(160C) and Deluxe Tudor. All other body styles still came standard with black enamel wheels. In July 1930, Ford made colored wheels available as an accessory on all passenger cars. At that time, only four colors were available: Tacoma Cream, Apple Green, Orange, and Aurora Red. The wheel color used was dependent on the pinstripe, Orange wheels with an orange pinstripe, Apple Green with an apple green pinstripe, Aurora Red wheels with a Vermillion pinstripe, and Tacoma Cream wheels with all other pinstripes.



In Sept 1930, Hessian Blue was added as a pinstripe and wheel color and was used on Lombard Blue painted cars.

In July 1931, Ford reduced the number of wheel colors to just three: Apple Green, Tacoma Cream, and Aurora Red. This changed the wheel color on only two paint combinations. Tacoma Cream was substituted for Hessian Blue and Aurora Red was used in place of Orange.



Model A Ignition wiring Diagram



Many Model A owners get overwhelmed when their engine won't start or dies while cruising down the road. Fortunately the Model A ignition system is a very simple electrical circuit. There are only six locations that are critical in the flow of electricity. All you really need to determine if you have an electrical problem is a simple test light. With the ignition key off: Start at the battery (#1) and the fuse block (#2), use your test light to make sure you have voltage and on both sides of the fuse. It is possible to have corroded battery terminals, bad connections on the fuse block, or a burnt out fuse. Corroded terminals create a high resistance and cause a major voltage drop when you hit the starter. Bad connections at the fuse block will also cause ignition problems. The next test point is the ammeter (#3). You can check the ammeter at the terminal box on the firewall. There should be voltage at both terminals, if not the ammeter and its wiring needs to be checked. If all is well so far, your next test point is the coil (#4), you should have voltage on both coil terminals. If not, remove the red wire on the coil and check again. If you now have voltage on both sides, you have a problem further on. If the voltage is still only in one side you have a bad coil. Moving along, it's time to check the key (#5) and the Distributor (#6). Check the points to see if they are open, if they aren't put a piece of paper between them. Turn on the key and check for voltage at the points. If you have no voltage, first try moving the spark lever. If you now get voltage at the points the wire between the bottom and top plate could be shorting to the distributor body or frayed. If still no voltage remove the top plate and check for voltage on the bottom plate. If none, check to see if the connection from the ignition switch is screwed in too far and has shorted out on the distributor body. If so back off a few turns of the connection. If you now have voltage to the points, reassemble the top plate and remove the paper between the points. You should have no voltage at the points because the point are completing the circuit to ground. If you still have voltage, the points need to be dressed with a point file or replaced or you need to make sure the distributor is properly ground to the engine. Once you have the point working properly, the engine should now start. If not, well that's another article. Note: This may seem like it takes a long time, but it really on takes a minute or two to check.

Make Your Cloche Hat

On of the activities at this year's New England Model A Meet will be a special seminar where you will be able to create your own Cloche hat. According to Diann Eason of MAFCA Era Fashion Committee the Cloche hat got its start in France about 1923 and were very popular during the Model A era. The movie industry was also influential in hat design. Hats worn by the "silver screen" stars, Greta Garbo, Louise Brooks, Marlene Dietrich, and Carole Lombard created excitement and creative opportunities. Needless to say, with stars of this caliber wearing these hats, women of the time were anxious to stay in style.

Below are some examples of how these hats can be stylized to fit any season or event.

Fall and winter hats might have a felt flower, a metal buckle from a worn out shoe, grosgrain ribbons, matching fabric attached in an interesting design, beads, velvet ribbons, feathers, and buttons.







Spring and summer hats allowed for the use of softer fabric flowers, cellophane flowers, beads, netting, embroidered flowers and designs, and straw braid.

Jim's Tech Tips

"The Right Tool for the Job" - Part 2

My previous Tech Tip dealt with using the right wrench to get a good grip on a nut or bolt when you need to apply a lot of torque (twist) to break it loose, or to fasten something well. Today we talk about something similar, when you need to apply a lot of twist to a plain slotted screw. If you use the right tool, you will loosen the screw and be happy. But all too often the tip of the screwdriver just chews up the slot in the screw. It's not you, it's the screwdriver.

The most common screwdriver sold today has a "standard taper" tip. It's kind of a "one size fits all" design. It does not really fit in the screw slot very well, and when you twist it hard, it climbs up out of the slot with what is known as "cam action". The harder you twist, the more the screwdriver tip wants to climb up out of the slot, taking metal with it. Pretty soon you have a screw that you can no longer get a good grip on to remove.

A much better screwdriver tip design, very popular with gunsmiths (because they need to apply a lot of torque to slotted screws without chewing them up) is called a "hollow ground" tip. These screwdrivers are precision ground so that the tip going into the screw slot has two very well formed, parallel sides that fill up the screw slot for a nice tight fit that you can really apply some torque to!





Hollow ground screwdrivers are sold in a wide assortment of tip widths (to match the length of the slot in the screw head) and tip thicknesses (to match the width of the slot). When you have a good assortment of them, you can carefully select the screwdriver with the tip that best fits the screw slot in both length and width.

I do not have room for a large collection of individual screwdrivers, so I bought myself a nice gunsmith screwdriver set in a case. It has many hollow ground tips of various widths and thicknesses, so I can find the one that best fits the screw I am dealing with.

Armed with these hollow ground tips and some penetrating oil, you should be able to break loose and refasten any screw you come across. Until next time, Have a Model A Day! Jim
