



Secretary's Report

Minutes of the Minuteman Model A Ford Club September 3, 2025

Sudbury Grange Hall, Sudbury, MA

President: Harold Samuels opened the meeting at 7:30 PM with the pledge of allegiance with 39 people attending. We then accepted the Secretary's report and the Treasurer's reports as printed in the Oil leak.

Vice president: Peter McLaughlin reported on a letter received from MARC that the Oil Leak and Doug Linden were given a newsletter award. He also reported that the October Wayside Inn dinner will be promoted by an upcoming email to the membership.

Membership: Nan Linden reported that we had a new member, Peter Graves of Salisbury, who has a 1931 Model A. She also mentioned that a past member Rick Andrews was at the meeting. Doug Linden

told of the advancement of the club's newsletter during Rick's time as editor back in the mid 70's.

Tour Director: Don Ross reported on Tours. He mentioned the five tours in August and that the New England Meet would be September 12-14, Sept. 18 to Erb's home for ice

cream, Sept. 27 to 88 Time machine in Hubbardston, and Dinner at Stephen Anthony's on the 30th.

National News: Doug Linden reported on National news. MAFFI will celebrate the reopening of the Model A museum's new addition on the 18th and 19th of September. He also mentioned that former member Gene Tallone is running for national office, and encouraged all MAFCA members to vote for Gene.

Old Business: President Samuels brought up the issue of raising the dues from \$20 to \$25 per year. After some discussion the vote was taken and overwhelmingly voted to raise the dues.

planning.

New Business: Doug Linden spoke of the Wayside Inn's 31 Ford Fire Truck that members got running, but it needs to have new tires mounted. There was discussion of where the wheels could be taken for tire mounting. J&K tire in Hudson was mentioned as a good possibility.

Dick Krug announced there would be a 50/50 raffle after the adjournment.

The president thanked Peter and Barbara for the refreshments and asked for volunteers for the next meeting and Doug Farrall and Sue Hart volunteered.

A question from the floor of which kind of tire should be used on 16-inch rims – Bias ply or radials. The answer came – Radials for 16-inch rims.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:08 PM.

Testing your Coil

During our recent tour to the Codman Estate one of the Model A's experienced a "no start" condition. After diagnosis it was determined the that coil had failed. The fact that the coil case was too hot to touch was a pretty good indication that something wasn't right. A new coil fixed the problem. So a question came up as to how can you test a coil to see if it is still useable. There are vintage ignition coil testers to test coils and condensers, but most of us don't have one of those in the garage. You can however use an OHM meter to take some basic measurements to give you a good idea. The following is a procedure from Les Andrews' Model A Ford Troubleshooting & Diagnostics (Blue) book.

Testing Coil

- 1. Turn ignition key OFF.
- 2. Remove high tension wire from center post on coil.
- 3. Remove black wire from (-) terminal on coil and remove red wire from (+) terminal on coil.
- 4. Using an ohmmeter (lowest scale), measure resistance from (+) coil terminal to (-) terminal.

SHOULD MEASURE 1.6 ohms to 1.8 ohms

 Set ohmmeter to 10K scale. Measure resistance from each coil terminal (+) and (-), to the center (high tension) contact.

SHOULD MEASURE


6.7K ohms to 10K ohms

6. Measure resistance from each coil terminal (+) and (-), to the outer metal case of the coil.


SHOULD MEASURE Open circuit

CORRECTIVE ACTION

If tests 4 and 5 show a short or open reading, it indicates a defective coil. If test 5 shows any reading except open (infinity), the coil is defective. Replace coil.

~ News From The Era ~ 20s - 30s: AUTO CAMPS, MOTOR COURTS, MOTELS

Auto camps are first

There was once a time when every roadside lodging was unique. At first, there were auto camps which were established in the 1920s as primitive municipal camp sites where travelers pitched their own tents and until the first travel trailers became available in the 1930s, auto tourists adapted their cars by adding beds, makeshift kitchens, and roof decks. As demand increased, for-profit commercial camps gradually displaced public campgrounds.



Then the rise: Motor courts spring up along roadsides

The next step up from the auto camp was the motor court (also called auto court), a primitive but permanent group of structures. These were the "mom-and-pop" motor courts that dotted every highway nationwide. They originated in the late 1920s and 1930s with primitive tourist cabins similar to the one below. These cabins offered the privacy and shelter lacking in the earlier auto camps.



In the 30s, tourist cabins and cottages were increasingly clustered together into larger motor courts. They featured enhanced amenities such as private showers, gas pumps, and lunch rooms.

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


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
