

Sept 6: Five Model A's have been approved for admittance to the Navy Yard. Other guests can attend but will have to park outside the grounds.



Minutes of the Minuteman Model A Ford Club August 6, 2025



IMPORTANT DUES ANNOUNCEMENT

At the club's recent Board Meeting the subject of our expenses was discussed, and specifically the cost to produce our award winning newsletter. Given the recent printing and US Postage price increases our current dues of \$20 doesn't cover the cost of the newsletter. It isn't just the newsletter, but other expenses the club underwrites have gone up as well. The club has trimmed budget items, probably the largest being the new meeting location, but balancing the annual budget is still very challenging.

In light of these increases the Board has recommended that we raise our annual club dues starting in 2026 to \$25 per year.

The Board wanted all members to receive advance notice of this proposed recommendation so it can be discussed and voted on at the September 3rd club meeting.


